I. Distinctive Activities of the Holy Spirit

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The Two Great Words

The Written Word – 2 Peter 1:20-21: Scripture was “carried along by the Holy Spirit.” The biblical writers were guided by the unseen hand of the Spirit both during the writing process and throughout their lives, resulting in inspired and trustworthy Scripture.

The Living Word – John 14:13-14: When believers pray according to God’s will, God receives glory through the work manifested by the Holy Spirit. Miracles and manifestations reveal God’s greatness. The Greek word *dunamis* means power, strength, ability, or might.

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The Work of Redemption – Revelation 22:17: The Holy Spirit invites humanity to salvation and eternal fellowship with Christ.

Overarching Ministries of the Holy Spirit

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Old Testament Covenant Ministry

Regeneration and Heart Transformation: Deuteronomy 30:6 describes “circumcision of the heart,” meaning spiritual renewal through the Holy Spirit. Ezekiel 11:19-20 and Ezekiel 36:26-27 promise a new heart and Spirit producing obedience and faithfulness. Jeremiah 31:33-34 foretells God writing His law on the hearts of His people. Ezekiel 37:1-14 uses the valley of dry bones to illustrate spiritual resurrection and renewal.

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
